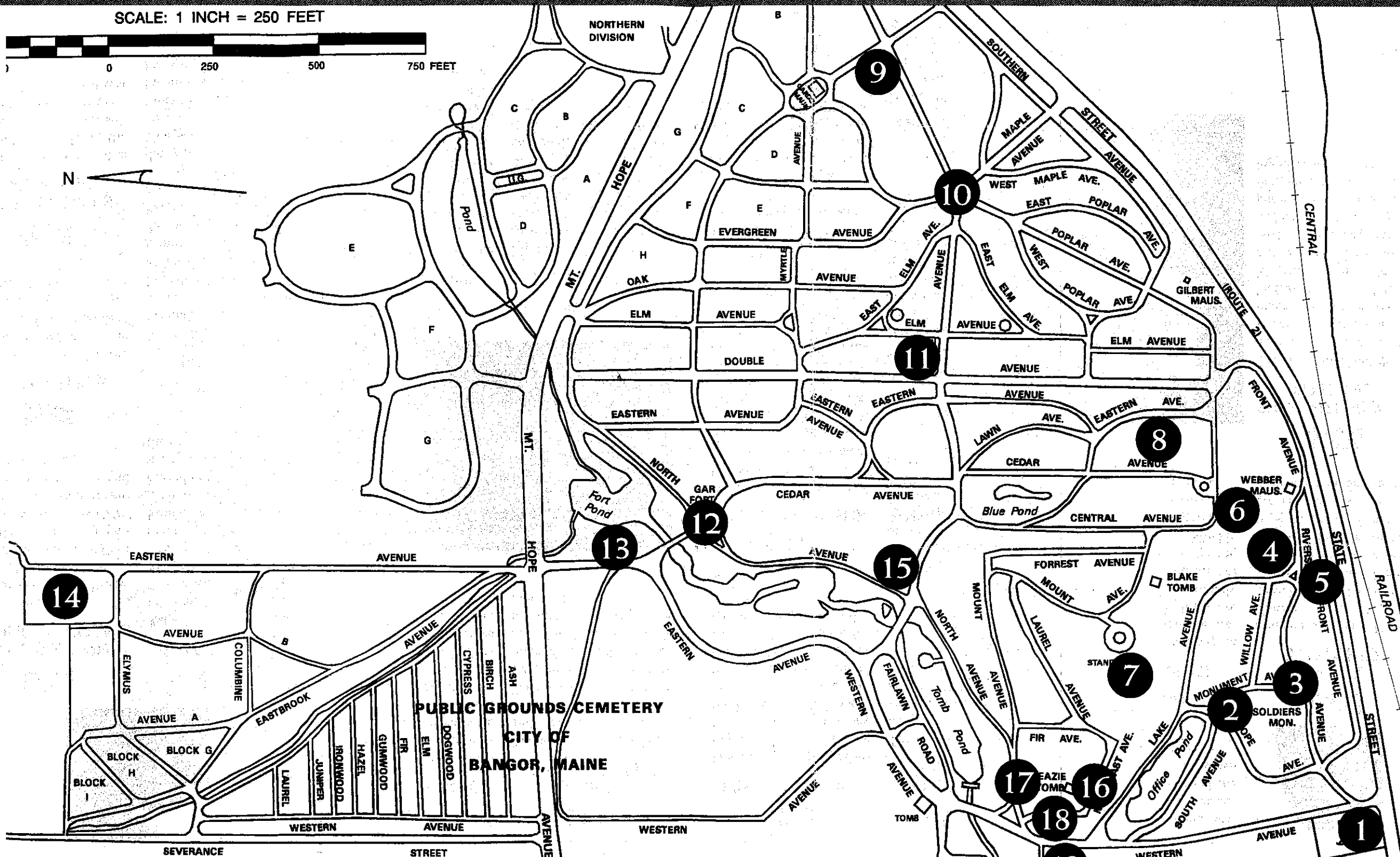

### THE SECOND MAINE MEMORIAL

This memorial was designed by Luther H. Peirce, a member of that unit. It was dedicated in 1962 to the first Maine men who saw action in the Civil War. A monument to heroism, the figure shows pain, and its wings express glory.

### MARY S. SNOW

Mary S. Snow led Bangor's education system in the 1890's as Superintendent and founder of Bangor Teachers Training School.

### THE SOLDIERS MEMORIAL

The first such memorial to be built in the U.S., the Soldiers Memorial was dedicated in 1864 to commemorate all Bangor's Civil War dead.

### RUFUS DWINEL

Rufus Dwinel was a colorful, controversial, unmarried "lumber baron." According to legend, his housekeeper was to receive a large bequest, provided that Rufus was buried above ground. He is actually buried underground, and his housekeeper received the bequest anyway.

### HANNIBAL HAMLIN

Hannibal Hamlin had been a U.S. Senator, Vice President under Lincoln, Maine's Governor, and Minister to Spain, but he died while playing cards at Bangor's Tarratine Club. Sons Charles and Cyrus served in the Civil War, daughter Sarah and son Charles were present at Ford's Theater when Lincoln was shot. Hannibal's two wives were half sisters.

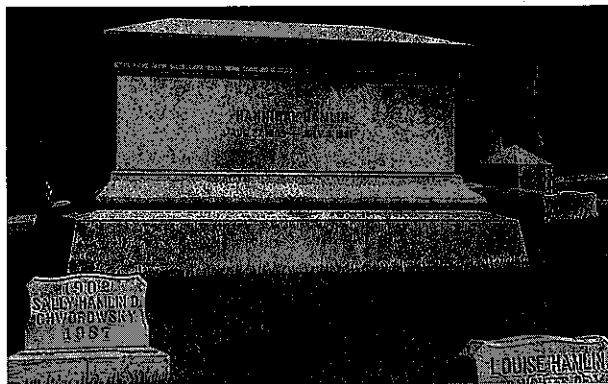
### WALDO PEIRCE

Waldo Peirce was a renowned American impressionist painter, known as the American "Renoir". Serving first the French, and later the U.S. in WWI, he remained in Europe after the war, becoming Ernest Hemingway's friend and travel companion.

### CHARLES EUGENE TEFFT

The son of a Brewer mayor, and grandson of a college president, Charles Eugene Tefft was a noted American sculptor, teacher, and lecturer whose work is represented in three of Bangor's downtown parks and in the Brewer library.

### PARK HOLLAND

Park Holland was with the 5th Massachusetts Infantry in the Revolutionary War. Coming to Bangor as a surveyor in the late 1700's, he developed the "Holland Map" which is still in use. His monument is a gift from the Massachusetts Society of Cincinnati in memory of his Revolutionary War service.

### MERLE FOGG

Merle Fogg was one of Maine's earliest licensed aviators. He died in Fort Lauderdale, Florida in 1928, at the age of 29, when his WACO 10 plane crashed in an orange grove while a student pilot was receiving instruction.

### FREDERICK HILL

Frederick Hill was a philanthropist whose vast banking fortune was divided among the Bangor Public Library, University of Maine, and Eastern Maine General Hospital. He traveled extensively to develop ideas for his mausoleum, finding this design in California.

### WILFRED MANSUR

Wilfred Mansur was one of Bangor's important architects whose designs included the Penobscot County Courthouse, the YMCA, the Bangor Theological Seminary's gymnasium, and the Superintendent's building at Mount Hope Cemetery.

### GAR LOT

The cannons and fort on the Grand Army of the Republic Lot are dedicated to the burial of those who fought in the Civil War. The area originally designated could not accommodate the many fallen, and an additional lot was designed.

### KOREAN WAR MEMORIAL

The Korean War Memorial names the 233 Maine servicemen who died in Korea and the 50 who were reported MIA.

### AL BRADY

Al Brady, the infamous gangster and public enemy number one, was gunned down by FBI agents in downtown Bangor on Columbus Day, 1937. His remains lie in an unmarked grave.

### THOMAS HOWARD

Thomas Howard and his wife Mary were early pioneers who arrived here before the Revolutionary War. They settled in the area of what is now State Street, and their child was the first non-Native American born here.

### SAMUEL VEAZIE

Samuel Veazie amassed a great fortune in assets that included a Bangor bank, eighty sawmills, real estate, and timberlands. He

believed that Bangor was taxing his property excessively and petitioned the State Legislature for his own town, named Veazie.

### PETER EDES

Peter Edes youth was spent in Boston where he was active in Revolutionary activities. He eventually became the editor of Bangor's first newspaper, The Bangor Weekly Register, accepting some of his subscription payments in wheat, butter, or cheese.

### GEORGE THATCHER

Marrried to Henry David Thoreau's cousin, George Thatcher was referred to in Thoreau's The Maine Woods as "the relative" who accompanied him on his trips. Near the Thatcher graves are those of Thoreau's aunts and cousin.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S BUILDING

The Superintendent's Building is a typical early 1900's structure in the popular English half-timbered style. Designed by Wilfred Mansur, who is buried in this cemetery, this building has been perfectly preserved and still fulfills its original purpose as a place of business, information, and resting-place for visitors.
